



2022-2024 PRESIDENT'S SPECIAL PROJECT:

Our theme for the 2022-2024 administration is, *"Bloom Where You Are Planted – Getting Back To Our GFWC Roots – by promoting public libraries, education and literacy!"*

Throughout its history, GFWC has advanced education, partly through the establishment and support of public libraries. In the 1930s, the American Library Association credited the GFWC for establishing 75 percent of America's public libraries. Education remains a critical factor in how Americans learn and connect with communities. GFWC club women promote education in both children and adults. GFWC Education and Libraries Community Service Program's purpose is to ensure club projects in the Education and Libraries Community Service Program are designed to foster schools and other educational institutions and opportunities and promote libraries and literacy, and the love of a good book.



Mississippi Federated Woman's clubs have significantly impacted the establishment and supported libraries since 1925. Originally nationally known, Andrew Carnegie established the library system by developing the Carnegie Foundation to establish libraries. Mississippi benefited from this Foundation, and eleven libraries were erected in ten communities across the state from 1908 to 1916. However, the Mississippi Federation of Women's Clubs made a significant impact across the state for public libraries. Our Mississippi Library Commission noted the following quote "Without the support and steadfast resolve of the women in the various women's clubs in Mississippi, public libraries would have taken a back-row seat to many other community projects. However, in 1925, the state federation of women's clubs determined to ask for library service in every county in the state. In 1926 the Mississippi Library Commission was established and adopted the same goal as the women's clubs. It would take more than 50 years to accomplish this goal. Wow! Does what our club members do across our state make a difference?"

Our public libraries are our educational institutions. These shared libraries, along with college libraries, and academic and educational opportunities, improve the literacy levels of individuals and support life-long learning for education.

Please join me in the next two years to promote public libraries, education, and literacy in our local communities and across our state for our President Special Project 2022-2024.

Let's get back to our GFWC Roots by promoting public libraries, education, and literacy.

OVERVIEW

The **GFWC-MFWC REPORTING GUIDE** contains instructions for successfully completing reports for GFWC-MFWC President's Special Project, GFWC-MFWC Special Emphasis Programs, GFWC Special Programs, Community Service Programs and GFWC Advancement Plans.

This Guide has been designed to provide step-by-step instructions to ensure all Club Presidents understand how to fill out the reporting GFWC-MFWC Report Cover Sheet and program narratives.

This Guide is intended to ensure accountability and support throughout the entire reporting process from documentation of activities to submitting of reports.

MFWC SUPPORT

Please email or contact the GFWC-MFWC Vice President/Dean of Chairmen if you have any questions, issues or concerns related to reporting. If you feel you need further clarification, you may email the GFWC-MFWC President. Please allow for a 3-4 days turnaround period in responding to emails. For quicker email turnaround, please mark your email as "Highly Important" if the matter is urgent.

REPORTING DEFINITIONS

- **NARRATIVE.** Narrative reports are limited to 3 single spaced pages. Only the front side of page can be used. Narrative information should include if applicable: Why? What? Outcome? Impact? Monetary and In-kind donations.
- **SUPPORTIVE DOCUMENTATION.** There may be up to 3 pages of supportive documentation, however, only the front side of the page can be used- no printing on both sides of paper. Supporting material may include newspaper clippings, pictures of members volunteering, pictures of members participating in projects, resolutions, certificates, minutes from other organizations, thank you notes, correspondence, copies of checks and etc. The supportive documentation pages need to be paper clipped- **do not staple**. Use only current materials.
- **PROJECTS.** Community Service Projects are the programs and projects members initiate and participate in to serve their communities, including projects with GFWC Affiliate Organization. GFWC encourages club women not simply to provide monetary donations but to participate in hands-on tangible projects that provide immediate impact.
- **DOLLARS DONATED.** Dollars Donated is the monetary amount given to Community Service Programs and projects. Dollars donated does not apply to Advancement Plans. See below.
- **DOLLARS SPENT.** Dollars Spent are costs incurred by members, clubs or GFWC-MFWC to achieve Advancement Plan goals. Advancement Plans are Communications and Public Relations, Leadership, Legislation/ Public Policy, and Membership
- **DOLLARS RAISED.** Dollars Raised reflects the dollars earned from fundraising and development programs and projects. (FUNDRAISING AND DEVELOPMENT ONLY)
- **IN-KIND DONATIONS.** In-Kind Donations reflect the monetary value for goods provided to Community Service Programs and projects. Download the latest copy from the GFWC Member Portal, My Digital Library, Resources, Letter I, In-Kind Donation Guide.pdf.
- **GFWC-MFWC REPORT COVER SHEET.** To report your club statistics in each of the GFWC-MFWC President's Special Project & Special Emphasis Programs, GFWC Special Programs, GFWC Community Service Programs (CSP) and GFWC Advancement Plans (AP), a club must complete one GFWC-MFWC Report Cover Sheet for each GFWC-MFWC President Special Project & Special Emphasis Programs, GFWC Special Program, GFWC Community Service Programs (CSP) and GFWC Advancement Plans (AP).
- **REPORTING CARD.** A form used by GFWC-MFWC Chairmen to allow more objectivity in judging.

CROSS REPORTING

Cross reporting is NOT allowed with the exception of three areas.

- The GFWC-MFWC President's Special Project (PSP) *"Bloom Where You Are Planted, Getting Back To Our GFWC Roots"* can be reported under both the GFWC-MFWC PSP and GFWC Education and Libraries CSP.
- State Institutions can be reported under both GFWC-MFWC State Institution and one of the following GFWC CSP
 - Mississippi State Schools for Deaf and Blind, Ellisville State School and other State Schools can be reported under Education and Libraries.
 - Mississippi State Hospital at Whitfield, MS and other State Hospitals can be reported under Health and Wellness.
 - State Veteran's Homes projects can be reported under Civic Engagement and Outreach.
- Mississippi Public Broadcasting can be reported under both GFWC-MFWC MPB and Education and Libraries.



SPECIAL REPORTING TIPS

Listed below are reporting tips that will help you in reporting your clubs volunteer hours and projects.

- Read the GFWC Guidelines for each Special Program, CSP and AP.
- Follow the GFWC Guidelines. This is what makes award-winning clubs.
- Report everything that your club does - if unsure where to report a project, just put in the place where it makes the most sense.
- The number of members involved in the project cannot exceed the number of club members - even if you work with another group - you just have X number of members.
- 1734 Society go under Women's History and Resource Center.
- HOBY should be included in Education and Libraries CSP Report.
- ESO. Projects involving ESO should be reported under Education & Libraries CSP, adhering to GFWC guidelines for ESO. **ESO Books Read (from the GFWC ESO List and the MFWC ESO list) and Hours should be reported on the Statistical Form under ESO.**
- Youth Art should be reported under Arts & Culture.
- *GFWC Clubwoman* should be reported under Advancement Area – Communications.
- In order to “count” for reporting, the activity must be a club-sanctioned event or a club approved event or project.
- Several clubs put monthly report forms for general members in their handbook and have a door prize drawing for those who turned in a report form for that month.
- You may split report, i.e., funds raised, publicity, and the project – but you cannot count in three places. Please make a note when you split report (for example: dollars raised reported under Fundraising).



HINT: To enhance winning an award a club should submit a narrative and supporting materials in all areas that a report is submitted. Remember ... A GFWC-MFWC Report Cover Sheet must be submitted with each report. Attach the completed GFWC-MFWC Report Cover Sheet to the narrative and supporting material with a paper clip.

JUDGING PROCESS

- State Chairmen will judge your report. Neither the GFWC-MFWC President nor GFWC-MFWC Vice President judges any reports.
- Awards will be given to all areas reported on the GFWC-MFWC Statistical report. There will not be separate awards for partnerships as they are included in the CSP reports.
- Chairman do not judge reports in their district.
- Awards for five placements or top five scores will be granted to each District for the CSP, Advancement Plans, and GFWC Signature Programs and GFWC-MFWC Special Emphasis Programs. Clubs will be awarded these five places according to the top scores at each District Conventions in 2023 and 2024. Clubs will also be awarded at the State level for the top five scores at the State Convention in April.

ELIGIBILITY AND TIMELINES

To have your reports judged and to be eligible for District and State Awards, you must meet these eligibility requirements:

- GFWC-MFWC State dues must be postmarked prior to January 1 each year for club reports to be judged and to be eligible for awards. Please note: if the postmark deadline falls on a Sunday or Holiday the form must be postmarked prior to postmark date.
- Reports must be postmarked by February 1. Please note: if the postmark deadline falls on a Sunday or Holiday the form must be postmarked prior to postmark date.
- Clubs who submit reports to be judged must submit the GFWC-MFWC Report Cover sheet filled out completely for each GFWC-MFWC Special Projects & Special Emphasis Programs, GFWC Special Programs, GFWC Community Service Programs (CSP) and GFWC Advancement Plans (AP).

SUBMITTING OF CLUB REPORTS

Club reports can be submitted for judging by first class mail or email. Postmark deadline is February 1st for both forms of submission.

- Copies of club reports must be mailed via **first class mail** to the following:

 - Juniette Clubs will also need to send a copy of completed reports to Michelle Sutton, GFWC-MFWC Juniette Director.

 - Meri F. Newell, GFWC-MFWC Vice President/Dean of Chairmen. Send copies of GFWC-MFWC Report Cover Sheet, narrative and supporting material for each report.
 - Juniette Clubs will also need to send a copy of completed reports to Michelle Sutton, GFWC-MFWC Juniette Director.

 - Each program area must be submitted in separate email. Don't not mix program areas in same email.
 - All required documents must be attached to the same email. Example: the email for any program area should contain the following information - GFWC-MFWC Report Cover Sheet, narrative and supporting material. When submitting reports information for GFWC-MFWC Presidents Project, MPB and State Institutions, be sure to include their individual reports in the email.
