About our Beautiful MFWC Headquarters



In 1934, during the depression, the darling, young eighteenth MFWC President, Mrs. O.B. Taylor, formed a committee to determine the possibility of establishing a Federation home. There was \$1,000 available, and at the State Convention, an additional \$3,000 was approved.

In 1935, the Mississippi Legislature, in recognition of the work being done by the Federation, leased to that body a lot on which to build its headquarters. The building is located in Jackson, near the State Capitol, as the clubwomen wished it to be. It was built by WPA labor.

Since its dedication in 1936, this edifice has been treasured by Mississippi clubwomen. It has been used for many and varied Federation functions, among which are club meetings, Executive Board meetings, summer institutes, Southern Region functions, and receptions, including a special one in 1998 commemorating the Mississippi Federation's Centennial. It has served as a repository for all the Federation's records, including yearbooks, histories, magazines, portraits of most all of the fifty-seven State Presidents in beautiful frames, photographs, and memorabilia of over one hundred years of Mississippi clubwomen's service.

It stands proudly today as a testimony to all the courageous and stalwart women of the Mississippi Federation who have worked to preserve and enhance its beauty for the seventy-six years of its existence. In 1998, during the Presidency of Mrs. Sue Thompson, a special presentation was made at the Headquarters by the Mississippi Department of Archives and History and the Historical Marker was placed in front of the building.

The Headquarters is home to a signed Baby Grand Steinway piano by Theodore Steinway and dated 1936. The President's Suite has a beautiful half tester antique Mallard bed, marble topped dresser, end table, and chairs. The sitting room has a beautiful antique armoire, marble topped table, chairs, and floor lamps. There are two other bedrooms furnished by and in honor of past Presidents Sue Thompson and Celia Fisher including hand-painted pictures of Confederate Roses painted by Harvey Fisher. Most of the furnishings are antiques, but there are a few newer pieces that have been added.

Due to problems caused by Yazoo clay, in 2003, the legislature provided over one million dollars to renovate/restore the Headquarters. That restoration included central air and heat, water sprinkler system, and alarm system as well as the filling of cracks, painting, building back the porches, and widening/paving the parking area in the back. Viking appliances were donated for the new kitchen. The Mississippi Department of Archives and History provided a fence, and landscaping and a sprinkler system were funded by the "1935 Society" Fund.

Yes, it still takes funds for the upkeep of the Headquarters just like it takes funds for each of us to keep up our homes, but is it well worth it. We love our Headquarters! I wish more of our members could come and see it. It is available for club meetings or just a tour when you are in town. If you have local clubhouses, you know they have to be kept up and how much it means to have a place to meet and to store your club's history. I hope you will support the Headquarters by contributing to "The 1935 Society" in your budget as the Preservation of Historical buildings is a part of our Heritage.

Your Executive Board of around eighty members, that changes year by year, enjoys meeting at the Headquarters for Winter Board/Judging Day, Summer Board, and other occasions. Come and visit when you can!

Winter Board Meeting Report GFWC-MFWC Recording Secretary Sue Addy

Valentines and carnations decorated the GFWC-MFWC Headquarters Building February 11, 2012, in preparation for the Winter Executive Board Meeting and Judging Day. Fiftyeight members and one guest were present.

The following items of business were voted upon by the board:

1. To authorize Teenie Boone, Headquarters Chairman, to arrange for repairs to the building and to bring headquarters up to fire code standards.

2. To give Smithville School Library money from the MS Flood and Tornado Relief Fund.

3. To authorize Suzanne Poynor and Diane Rouse to make arrangements for the 2013 Southern Region Conference in

Biloxi and allowing Executive Committee Members to sign necessary documents.

4. To authorize Suzanne Poynor to spend money from the Ways and Means Fund in preparation for the 2012-2014 Ways and Means Fundraisers.

Membership Chairman Suzanne Poynor reported that MFWC had 1,360 members and 60 clubs in 2011. The Wanted Alive Club Member Contest netted 54 new members.

Libby Everett, Dean of Chairmen, highlighted guidelines for judging reports. Forty two clubs reported 245,455 volunteer hours, donating \$834,332 and \$1,928,025 in kind donations. State chairmen were urged to file reports with their GFWC counterparts by the March 15 deadline and to include a copy of the first place state report as supportive material.

June Vaughn, Nominating Committee Chairman, informed the board of the slate of officers to be presented for election at the State Convention on April 27, 2012. They are Darlene Adams, President-elect; Sue Addy, Vice President; Abby May, Recording Secretary; and Diane Rouse, Treasurer.

Sherri Reid shared experiences from Southern Region Conference in Tampa, FL, October 28-30, 2011. The Mississippi delegation honored Celia Fisher, MFWC's Jennie winner with a reception.

Following the reading of the Collect and a delicious catered lunch, the afternoon was spent judging reports.

Flour and sugar were purchased in cloth sacks. When the sack was empty, it was washed and made into clothing, aprons, dish cloths, and sometimes even diapers. Glass jars which may have contained condiments, juice, or milk were either left on the door step to be picked up for refilling, or they were used for other things around our homes. Glass was never thrown away.

Food was never wasted. If there was food not eaten, those items, that could be, were composted for use later as fertilizer and others were used as feed for farm animals, like pigs, chicken, and yes, even dogs and cats. In the last few years, thankfully, our world has become more concerned about taking care of our planet, strengthening our financial resources, and getting away from our throwaway society. We are working to keep our water and our air clean and our roads free of litter, lessening the amount of garbage that is sent to landfills, and being more conservative with the amount of fuel that we use in our daily lives. Schools are another area that welcomes support. GFWC-MFWC has a Challenge grant to support special education classes, a Hebron Scholarship for graduates entering college, and art contests at district and state levels. Of course clubs can offer local scholarships for graduating seniors, summer programs and camps, college and university sponsored courses, tuition for adult participation in literacy programs, or reading programs for elementary classes and groups. A visit with a school superintendent or principal may open some interesting and important opportunities for service.

Clubs have an obligation to "educate yourself" through reading and participating in academic classes, local arts and dance events and activities, field trips, etc. An excellent option is to consider GFWC Epsilon Sigma Omicron, an organization that promotes self-learning through reading.

A great opportunity to gain new ideas is to attend the Summer Conference and district and state conventions. You can interact with very active club members from other clubs, share ideas, and learn what works.

HOME LIFE

The only national honor that recognizes individual members for personal excellence, it is the highest honor bestowed by GFWC.

MFWC is pleased to recognize Celia Fisher as its 2011 recipient of the Jennie Award. A member of the Lanier Club in Okolona since 1962, Celia served in most offices and on most committees of the club, being club president

for the first time at age 23. From there, she began many years of federated volunteer service on the local, district and state levels, culminating in serving as 2002-2004 MFWC President. Her MFWC President's Special Project was the National Breast Cancer Foundation. During the two years of this project, \$40,000 was sent back to the Mississippi Health Department where over 700 women received mammograms as a result of this project. Notably, Celia was instrumental in the securing of a grant for the total renovation of the MFWC Headquarters Building in Jackson. Additionally, when GFWC began its LEADS program, she led the way in creating a LEADS seminar on the state level.

Still active at the local, district, and state level, Celia is now her club's vice president and yearbook chairman, District III Parliamentarian, and MFWC State Historian. She is serving her second term as Secretary-Treasurer of the Gavel Club, whose members are former presidents of MFWC. She is serving her second five-year term on the Mississippi Library Commission Board, having served as Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Secretary.



A teacher for 28 years at Okolona High School, Celia was respected and admired by students, parents, faculty, and administration. Her goal in teaching was not only to teach the facts but to instill patriotism, the desire to be productive citizens, and a thirst for knowledge. Celia was chosen by three of the school's "Star Students" (selected by the Mississippi Economic Council) as their "Star Teacher". The Okolona Chamber of Commerce named her "Outstanding Educator" of the year and in 2003 the Chamber of Commerce named her "Okolona Citizen of the Year". The Mississippi Society Daughters of the American Revolution selected her as "Mississippi's American History Teacher of the Year."

A member of the First United Methodist Church of Okolona, she has served on the Administrative Board and as Treasurer of the Board of Trustees and continues to be an active member of the United Methodist Women. A member of the Chuquatonchee Chapter of the USDAR, she has served as Chapter Historian and is now Vice Regent and Yearbook Chairman. Celia is a member of the Okolona Chamber of Commerce and has been a volunteer mentor for the Excel GED program. She authored a revision of both the "History of Okolona" for the 150th anniversary celebration and the "History of the Okolona First United Methodist Church".

Celia is recognized locally and regionally as a talented speaker and speaks often to organizations, church groups, or student groups. The "Summer Reading Program for Children" in Mississippi Public Libraries is one of her favorite forums. Her favorite topics are her travels, history, and love of country.

Married for 53 years, Celia and her husband Harvey are proud parents of three adult daugthers. The Fishers have six grandchildren and three great granddaughters.
