It is the highest award given to an individual. GFWC calls her "one who epitomizes her spirit of independence, courage, and persistence in purpose through her volunteer role."

WHAT is the GFWC Jennie Award Contest? GFWC has a special award for someone such as this. It's called the "Jennie Award," named after founder Jane Cunningham Croly. The GFWC evaluation criteria are: commitment to club, commitment to community and commitment to family. This award is the only national honor given to an individual member.

HOW can you nominate someone from your club? Complete the official Jennie Award form provided through GFWC.org or linked through our GFWC-MFWC state website. Include all required documents along with form and send to Tinker Forrester, GFWC-MFWC State President, 5257 MS Highway 15, Ackerman, MS, 39735 by March 15, 2017. In order to not be disqualified, please adhere to official award rules.

WHERE does the process go from here? After the state committee chooses the MFWC nominee, the nominee goes on to the regional, and finally, on to GFWC for the national competition.

I know we have many within our clubs that are deserving of this award and encourage clubs to take the time to nominate these precious women that make up our federation.

It is my great pleasure to serve as your MFWC Youth Art Chairman again for the next two years. This competition parallels our MFWC President's mission, "Inform Minds and Inspire Hearts." Learning to create and appreciate visual art may be more important than ever to the development of the next generation of children as they grow up.

Plans are in the works for participation in Youth Art for special education students. Stay tuned. You will learn more about this at Summer Institute.

Youth Art is a state competition only. Winners are not sent to GFWC for judging so there is no need for a GFWC consent form signed by the parents, however, the club may choose to send a letter to the parent notifying them that their child's artwork has been chosen to be submitted. The selection process to determine submissions is decided by your club. The guidelines are displayed in the MFWC handbook and online. Please follow them before submitting artwork to your district convention.

* First place district winners in each class and division are sent from the district conventions to the state chairman. Districts provide cash prizes if that is in their bylaws.

* All district submissions are displayed at the state convention. MFWC provides a cash prize (\$10.00) to the 15 first place state winners. Second and third place receive a ribbon. Districts/clubs are responsible for picking up their artwork at the conclusion of state convention.



New this year is Youth Art Challenge. This competition is for students receiving on art instruction from private teachers or certified art teachers; teachers giving art instruction in the self-contained classroom

would fall in this category. This competition focuses on low-incidence disability students who are considered "self-contained." District first place entries will go directly to state level competition. First, second, and third place ribbons will be awarded in each division. Please see the MFWC website for complete details on this competition!

When submitting artwork, please be respectful of the artist's work-no matter how young. Take care to treat delicate artwork with care and cover with a transparent material or fixative – NO GLASS. Please do not submit art work on copy paper unless it is on backer board, poster board, card stock, or something to keep it tidy-NO FRAMES. I receive many pieces of youth art each year and I take special care that they are returned to the clubs in much the same way they were given to me.

At district conventions, a receptacle should be provided for the artwork to be transported by the state president or her designee. Two pieces of poster board taped together on three sides makes an excellent container. I look forward to working with all clubs. Please contact me if you have any questions.

YEARBOOKS:

It is pretty basic for Yearbooks. Remember to include the necessary information as stated on the MFWC guidelines for yearbooks. Attractive to the eye is important, but please remember to refer to the guidelines for information regarding GFWC officers, MFWC officers and your respective district officers. With Yearbooks, this is a tool for your membership to be able to function as highly as possible as a Federation member on the local, district, state and international levels. Including opportunities to serve, important dates, a calendar of deadlines and events on the local, district, state and international level, and membership information are key to creating a useful tool for your membership. A yearbook is an utilitarian item, but can be attractive and useful.

SCRAPBOOKS:

Scrapbooks are a monthly pictorial history of what your club is doing. Pretty is good. Neat is good. Please do not forget to refer to the MFWC guidelines. Also, please do not forget to include a group picture or labeled, individual pictures of your membership. Scrapbooks can be used as a recruiting tool to show a prospective member what your club is about and what your club does from the local level all the way to the international level. This is an opportunity to show activities and show off how much and what your club does for the community and Federation.

GFWC Photography Contest Chaírman: Carolyn Long

Mississippi has some great photographers. Each year judges have a difficult time choosing the state winner in each category. Only the first place entry in each category goes on to GFWC for judging.

Below are items that can count against even the best photograph:

- Mounting is very important (refer to guidelines). Edges MUST be smooth.
- All the required information as listed in the GFWC guidelines should be printed on the back of the entry.
- Neatness is extremely important.
- EACH entry must have signed waiver. DO NOT tape the wavier to the entry.

Contest categories are the same as last year:

- Living Things—adults, animals, children, domestic birds, fish, flowers, insects, reptiles, wildlife
- Scenes—city, landscapes, rural areas, skies, sunrises, sunsets, waterscapes, weather
- Still Life—abstract (any assemblage of objects either in an arranged or natural setting), buildings, monuments
- GFWC Volunteers in Action—snap a picture of your club's favorite service project! Get those members in action!

Read the guidelines carefully. I do not know of any changes for the next two years. If I do get any changes, I will notify each district president. Keep your camera handy. You never know when the perfect shot will appear!

GFWC Advancement Area: Fundraísing & Development Nelda Mills, Chairman

FUNdraising can be FUN!!!! As you are busily planning your new GFWC-MFWC club year with your new group of club officers do not overlook fundraising!!! Because fundraising requires so much time and effort, within many clubs it has become the hated "F" word. However, fundraising is so important in every club and can actually be fun! Here are some ideas to get you started:

First you have to find a need/project. People are much more willing to support a fundraiser if they know exactly where their money will be used. Secondly, find an energetic, enthusiastic person who knows lots of people and make her committee chairman (woman). From that point the committee chairperson takes over and chooses her committee members. As a group they decide the type fundraiser they will do. By having a committee, this helps to "share the burden" that is sometimes carried by one person.

While there are some fundraisers that are more successful when handled totally within the club, don't forget to look outside your club to partner with other organizations. By partnering, both groups win and the workload is much less. For example, if the city chamber is doing a city wide garage sale, your club may choose to partner with them. If your city is doing a Christmas parade, a partnership might be arranged and the proceeds split. Another example is partnering with the local high school's culinary arts class to do the cooking for a club event and splitting the profits with them. There are many ways to partner with other groups or organizations outside your club to raise money for your projects as well as theirs.

Finally, as you begin your fundraising don't forget social media as a form of advertising. Advertising is such an important part of any successful event and with all the technology available today the sky is the limit!!!



Thank you for all of your support throughout the years. MFWC is a very important part of making Mississippi HOBY a success each year.

Each year there is some confusion about what a MFWC sponsorship entails, and I would like to help clarify what it means as far as covering the cost of a HOBY student attending the seminar. There are two fees that have to be paid for a student to attend HOBY. The first is a \$195.00 national registration fee that the schools send directly to the HOBY national office in California. This is the equivalent of paying tuition before you attend college and is paid by the school or the student's family. Mississippi HOBY does not handle this fee.

The second fee is a \$175.00 sponsorship fee that comes directly to Mississippi HOBY through the MFWC dues forms and covers the student's expenses (boarding, food, t-shirts, etc.) while attending the seminar. This is the equivalent of paying room and board at college. This sponsorship is what we as MFWC clubs provide in order for Mississippi HOBY to be able put on the seminar. This is paid on our MFWC dues forms each year on the HOBY line item. We encourage you to take the opportunity on the dues form to designate which school you would like to sponsor. While we cannot guarantee a student from your chosen school will attend, we will try our best to honor your choice. If you have had problems in the past with the school not sending a student, you can help by contacting the school counselor and encouraging participation. The emphasis is on "encouragement" to participate. It is not our place to take over the student selection process or to dictate which student should attend.

It's important in communication to the schools that you sponsor that the difference in these two fees is made clear. When a school hears the word "sponsor", they often times assume that everything is paid and this is not the case. Someone still needs to pay the national registration fee of \$195. Schools handle this differently. Some schools can afford to pay this themselves, some ask the student to do so, and others reach out to the community. This is strictly left up to each individual school.

An MFWC club can certainly cover all the cost if they so wish. Just make sure to communicate and work with your school counselor and provide them with the \$195.00 to send in to HOBY's national office. Mississippi HOBY does not make these payments, so it is not paid on our dues forms and must be sent through the school using the registration and invoice system provided to the schools at <u>www.hoby.org</u>. Just be sure to include this in your reporting.

Once again, Mississippi HOBY cannot say, "Thank You", enough for the ongoing support GFWC-MFWC have provided over the years.

The GFWC Community Improvement Program Award has been the Heart and Soul of GFWC since the 1950's and is its longest standing project.

The GFWC Community Improvement Program Award aims to enhance the lives of our neighbors around the world by meeting community specific needs and by elevating the status of clubs within the communities we serve. This biennium CIP will run from January1, 2016 until December 31, 2017.

Club projects that make your community a better place to live are "community improvement" projects and are eligible for state and national recognition and awards.

GFWC awards a total of \$19,360.00 to state and national winners of the CIP Award. The GFWC State Awards range from \$50.00 to \$25.00. The GFWC National Awards range from \$5000.00 to \$500.00. There is also \$500.00 for an affiliate award and \$250.00 for a Juniorette award.

Now is the time to begin your project, if you have not already begun. Remember to tailor your project to a specific need of your community. Solicit input and involvement from other organizations, local officials and community members. Roll up your sleeves, get involved and good luck!

- Ask a local bank if you can use their **marquee** sign for the week to advertise the event.

And the old-fashioned way, **word of mouth**. Talk to your friends on the street, in the grocery store, at church.

Be sure to check the Communications and Public Relations Advancement Guide in the 2016-2018 GFWC Club Manual if your club is interested in entering the media contest or if using the **GFWC brand**. There are restrictions and specific guidelines for word and emblem use, publications and advertising design, Web design, merchandising and more.

Inside Knowledge educates women and health care providers about the five most common types of gynecologic cancer: cervical, ovarian, uterine, vaginal, and vulvar. Inside Knowledge offers information and resources to women and health care providers about risk factors, symptoms, and prevention strategies associated with each of the cancers.

A vital part of the Home Life CSP is GFWC's formal partnership with like-minded organizations that affect the well-being of individuals, families, and communities. Please take advantage of the offerings from these partners of unique and customized services: materials, speakers, kits, and additional information specifically designed for GFWC clubs. Clubs are encouraged to include donations to the Home Life partners in their budgets and fundraising efforts. Communities across the country and around the globe benefit from the work of GFWC club members every day. One of the most vital goals we have is to ensure that this noble tradition continues into the future. Neighbors, friends, co-workers and family all deserve the chance to be a part of GFWC, because GFWC has, does, and will continue to be a game changer as we change for the better. It is important that we learn how to invite and encourage women to become part of our clubs so that our communities can continue to improve through the work of GFWC volunteers and programs.

Identify prospective members and be a game changer by inviting ladies from the office, at social gatherings, at community meetings, and at local schools to attend a meeting or better yet invite them to volunteer at one of your club's community service projects! Set goals for growth, but remember that **retention** is also important. Bridge the gap with members of all ages by being a unifier. To keep members, a club must find out who its members are, understand their expectations, and make every effort to serve them well. Members will decide to stay with their clubs only if they feel that their time and dues are being used effectively to improve communities, and if they feel a sense of ownership, pride, and belonging. Members need to feel that they play a role in club decisions and that their opinions count. **Engage your members.** A stable core of experienced members is the backbone of your club. New members can lean on and learn from seasoned members who have an institutional memory and history of involvement. Working together, experienced members and new members can function like one healthy body, standing tall, moving forward, and making strides toward accomplishing your club's goals. Members who actively participate in their club are more likely to want to continue their membership, in order to engage your members, your club should ensure an atmosphere of fellowship and friendship, and provide varied opportunities for them to exercise their talents and abilities. Encouraging involvement not only capitalizes on members' creativity and skills, but also increases their commitment and allegiance. Members need to feel at home and have a continuing reason to belong. Consider subsidizing a trip to a convention through a "dollars for delegates" program using raffles or fundraisers that would produce the revenue to offset the cost. Find ways to use the talents of ALL members and engage every member in club projects to avoid conflict.
