#### Administration Accomplishments: 2018-2020

- Encouraging all members to embrace the history within, MFWC graciously put out the welcome mat at our beautiful Headquarters, most notably welcoming GFWC International President Mary Ellen Brock. In additional to regular meetings, eight events were held at Headquarters as well as our welcoming guests for a two-page feature in *Find It In Fondren* magazine and the presentation of the Mississippi Digital Library 2019 Cultural Heritage Digitization Award.
- Amended the Constitution and Bylaws to reflect changes resulting from redistricting and amended Standing Rules pertaining to the Hebron Memorial Scholarship to clarify.
- In support of the President's Special Project, MFWC approved a Resolution for presentation to the GFWC Resolutions Committee. After consideration, the GFWC Resolutions Committee will be proposing the resolution at the 2020 GFWC Convention as an amendment to 013-540 Tobacco and Young People.
- Building on the reinstating of the ESO Charter, the President's Reading Challenge was
  established with monthly President's Picks plus four selections from Reading to
  Children to allow members "Reading with the President" to complete the required
  reading to become a member of ESO within the year.
- Established a Mississippi affiliate with I Support the Girls that allowed members to embrace the GFWC Signature Program to provide bras and hygiene items to those in need across Mississippi.
- Hosted Domestic Violence: kNOw More to bring awareness and provide education on prevention for the GFWC Signature Program including planting purple pinwheels on the Headquarters lawn.
- Chartered one General Club, Leading Ladies, consisting of GFWC LEADS Delegates and one Juniorette Club.
- Focusing on Leadership, held an Incoming Leaders Training at the beginning of the administration for club presidents, district officers, and state chairmen and two MS LEADS Seminars open to all members.
- To enhance our communication, officers visited almost every club in our state to build relationships, share knowledge and encourage leadership. Additionally, MFWC continued to publish two *Mississippi Clubwoman* magazines and nine editions of *The Heartbeat* –our GFWC-MFWC Newsletter.
- Empowering the heart to make a difference, MFWC embraced the Seven Grand Initiatives of GFWC International President Mary Ellen Brock, reminding GFWC and the world that Mississippi is the most charitable of all states. By implementing a service project at each state meeting and event, Mississippi not only supported the Seven Grand Initiatives, but also reflected on MFWC Past President's PSPs to remind members of the ways MFWC has a longstanding history of empowering the difference.

MFWC has been very busy this past year raising awareness about heart disease and supporting the American Heart Association in creative and impactful ways! We wanted to share some of our favorites!

- 20 clubs reported designating a club meeting to the President, AHA representative, or a health care professional delivering a heart healthy program.
- 9 clubs reported "raising their voice" by participating in You're the Cure.
- 11 clubs reported receiving a proclamation from their mayor urging support of women's heart health by declaring February Heart Month and Feb 1 as National Wear Red Day.
- 14 clubs reported presenting health moments at club meetings.

The Decatur Woman's Progressive Club had a VERY heart-filled February meeting! They invited MFWC President Becky Wright to speak about her PSP, had a cardiologist speak about how woman can guard and take care of their heart health, had a meditation on the topic of "Spiritual and Physical Heart Health", AND raised \$500 for the AHA with their Yellow Box Donation at that meeting alone.

Florentine Evening Club had their members bring heart healthy food donations for their local food pantry. Examples of items brought were cheerios, oatmeal, and black beans. Their club also made a \$500 donation to the PSP.

Florentine Club reported that thanks to all of the information about heart health and the importance of quick response, a member's daughter survived a heart attack because they knew the symptoms and she was taken to the ER immediately!

Raleigh Woman's Club presented programs on women's heart health to two local senior citizen groups. Also, 82% of their members attended educational classes/health fairs about women's health!

Quitman Woman's Club had a Wear Red Day for the Art Reception where they had 178 guests attend, to whom they distributed material about the Go Red for Women Movement. They also had Compass Home Health perform Women's Heart Health screenings at their end of the year banquet! During this very screening, one member was informed that she had an irregular heartbeat. The next day, she was referred to her doctor, who discovered that there was an issue with her heart. She immediately underwent heart surgery! This lady is very thankful to the PSP and endorses it as a lifesaving program from which she greatly benefited!

Present Day of Union Club prepared heart healthy snacks for the health fair at their local public school.

The Fine Arts Club of Bruce held a salad luncheon with the benefits from the fundraiser going to the MS Chapter of the American Heart Association in honor of the PSP. They raised \$1,196.15 through this event. They also sponsored a health fair where attendees received information about heart health, health screenings, nutrition assessments, blood pressure checks, fitness assessments, a blood drive, among other things. In collaboration with the University of MS, a survey was given to attendees concerning the community's access to healthy food. If the attendee took the survey, they were given a \$10 gift card to a local grocery store.

# President's Special Project

Batesville Woman's Club gave special education teachers a gift with heart healthy messages about "Detect, Protect, Correct" attached. They also donated 25 red knit hats to Batson for the Little Hats Big Heart campaign.

Ackerman 20th Century Club held a public, 4-hour CPR Class at the Choctaw County library. They raised \$200 for the PSP at their annual Christmas Brunch fundraiser. And, their PSP Chairman mad 105 Facebook posts regarding the PSP!!

In addition to the two heart health programs that the Woman's Club of Booneville had, each month, their president called attention to a "Heart Health Thought and Challenge". They awarded heart healthy snacks as door prizes.

Lanier Club hosted a program where a cardiologist spoke on women's heart health. They also have a member that donates her time taking blood pressure readings and educating clients about their medications at a local service organization.

The Civic Woman's Club of Picayune held a "food auction". Members prepared/cooked their favorite recipes and brought their dishes to be auctioned at their meeting. They were ready to eat, frozen for a rainy day, or even a picture with a promissory note to choose the day the winner would like the dish delivered. Fourteen meals were auctioned to the highest silent auction bidder. Dishes were heart healthy and all proceeds went to the American Heart Association on behalf of the PSP. What a fun fundraiser and winners got to enjoy a cook-free night!

Members of the Cosmopolitan Club of Petal knitted, crocheted, and solicited 59 little red hats for the Little Hats Big Hearts campaign at Batson Children hospital in honor of MFWC President Becky Wright's birthday. (Although she would probably want mentioned that the number of hats surpassed her number of years!) The Cosmopolitan Club also participated in an exercise challenge and 28 of their members reported getting cholesterol and blood pressure screenings – some women changed medication and some saw major changes as a result of a change in diet and exercise.

Homochitto Heritage Club partnered with their Juniorettes to decorate 500 bags for a local restaurant to advertise the AHA to their customers. Some of the decorations included heart healthy tips and signs of a stroke. One of their members also arranged for a speaker to talk about healthy eating and an instructor to teach a Mexican line dance at the Juniorette Retreat.

The Juniorette Diamonds of Picayune had an RN present a workshop on hand-free CPR. The community was invited through social media. The RN showed a film from the AHA and then gave a demonstration of the hands-free CPR. She then brought out "dummies" for the girls to practice own. She taught them that doing "something" was better than doing nothing.

Thank you all so much for the thought, time, and effort put into raising awareness for heart health and funds for the American Heart Association in honor of our President's Special Project! It is greatly appreciated!

When the ladies of the Women's Club of Gulfport saw the state of the garden area outside of Gulfport Public Library, they knew something had to be done.

"I think we all feel like public spaces should not only be functional, but beautiful if we can achieve that," says Women's Club of Gulfport President Vanessa Edwards-Wasson. "It's a small thing, but we've had so many people tell us how much they appreciate it."

The club started by maintaining the space with green-thumbed members, led by Conservation Chairman Sherry Galloway, going by to clean it up and weed every so often. Members pressure washed the library wall, then painted and installed scalloped edgers. They planted a variety of flora and added a bench and decorative garden accents, such as pots and a frog. While several club members worked on this project, Pollyanna Hartwell Robelen was a standout who spent countless hours planting, trimming, painting bird houses, and repurposing a box of glass chips into a bee watering station with frog. An area on the other side of the front gate could not grow grass because people parked their bicycles there. Sherry decided that pavers placed there would solve the beautification problem. The members met at their clubhouse where artists were discovered, or artists were born, by painting and designing their own pavers. Then they installed more than 70 decorative pavers. Laura Lambert designed and painted six pavers that formed their club logo, and She and Dee Roland placed those last pavers in the middle of the "patchwork quilt."

As it has been for several years, it will continue to be an ongoing project for the members of the Women's Club of Gulfport. "Since we are a community service-driven organization, we love doing projects such as this," continued Edwards-Wasson. "It's great to know that all our hard work created a space that can be enjoyed by all who visit the library."
